



CSE Caseload Performance Ratios 1991 - 1998



Average Payments in CSE Cases with a Collection 1994 - 1998








CSE Non-Welfare Cases 1988 - 1998

Total CSE Collections \$14.3 billion 1998





TANF Collections \$2.8 billion 1997



TANF Collections \$2.8 billion 1997





CSE Collections 1988 - 1998





Government Retained Welfare Collections and CSE Expenditures 1988 - 1998





Total Welfare Collections and Government Retained Collections 1994 - 1998




Net Federal and State CSE Revenues 1994 - 1998



Federal and State Shares of Collections 1994 - 1998




CSE Incentive Payments 1994 - 1998



States with CSE Savings 1994 - 1998






